Clarksville Transit plans, implements, maintains, and manages a public transportation system that allows for maximum mobility for the community with an emphasis on safety, quality, and efficiency. All routes are planned for maximum mobility efficiency and transfer reliability. There are additional services like paratransit and on-demand response areas available.

Franklin Transit Authority is managed by the Transportation Management Association (TMA) Group. The TMA Group is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit corporation that was established in 1988 as a public-private partnership of business, government, and community leaders.

TMA supports a regional transportation system that provides a variety of accessible, affordable, reliable, and interconnected transportation choices that are both healthy for the environment and for the public. TMA's goal is for everyone in every community and in every stage of life, to have affordable and convenient travel options available to them.

TMA manages a variety of mobility, transit and transportation demand management solutions within the Middle Tennessee region.

#### Mid Cumberland Human Resources Agency (MCHRA) mchra.com/public-transit 1-800-945-4125

The rural transportation system for the Mid-Cumberland Region, or Middle Tennessee. MCHRA provides routine service to the public, with particular care for seniors and persons with special needs. MCHRA is a curb-to-curb rural transportation system with flexible schedules to meet the needs of its passengers. Riders are scheduled on a first-come, first-served basis, with priority given to medical appointments. While advanced notice is requested, it is not required.

The Mule Town Trolley is a deviated fixed-route service that is part of the SCTDD Public Transportation Program. The trolley system, which serves Maury County, was established in 2013 with a fleet of only two trolleys. In six years, the trolley service has grown substantially due to an increase in ridership. The trolley program has expanded to 12 vehicles and 14 CDL license drivers, transporting over 3,000 commuters a month.






