








OUR MISSION

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TRANSIT ADVOCACY

OBJECTIVE

Over the next 6 weeks and the next 6 sessions, we will explore the transit landscape for the region and how it relates to economic recovery, affordability, equity, and quality of life. Individual research, class discussions, readings and expert presentations will guide you as you determine what transit options are available now to your community and the region, what options are needed for the future, and the next steps for moving the conversation forward.

OUTCOME

Before the first class, you will have completed the "<u>TCLA Pre-Survey</u>". This is to get you focused on transit and thinking critically about the role it plays throughout the region, in your community, as well as the importance of transportation to different community members.

INSPIRATION & MOVING CONVERSATION FORWARD

During the 4th and 5th class sessions, you will be given a question. The question will need to be answered in a brief speech during the Graduation Ceremony in the 6th, and final, class.

GUIDELINES

Using your initial "<u>TCLA Pre-Survey</u>" and the information you have gained from class presentations and discussions, prepare a thoughtful answer to the question posed to the class. Use the following guidelines:

- 60-90 seconds
- State your answer to the question clearly.
- Give back up to your answer (Refer to specific class sessions/presentations or ideas that came up during the previous five classes).
- Specify your ideas, findings, or recommendations.
- What will be your strategy to bring what you've learned back to your networks & wider community to move the conversation forward?

NOTES

Feel free to communicate with each other during and in-between classes via email or social media. I will email a recap of the class and a teaser for the upcoming class as a reminder each week. If there are any supplemental materials, I will either email them to you before/after class and/or print them out for the class session. Jim Schmitz, Transit Alliance Board Chair Area President Middle Tennessee, Regions Financial Corporation

The Nashville Chamber has been consistently recognized as a top local and regional economic development agency for its role in helping to deliver prosperity to Middle Tennessee communities The Chamber has also led the movement to improve public school performance through the creation of the Academies of Nashville, established the Moving Forward initiative to ensure the creation of a regional transportation solution through a cohesive community effort and developed into a respected publisher of data on the Nashville Metropolitan Statistical Area with the annual publication of the Vital Signs report.

Schulz currently serves on numerous civic and nonprofit boards including the Nashville Health Care Council, Tennessee Business Roundtable, NashvilleHealth, Music City Music Council, Nashville Predators Foundation and the Board of Trustees of Father Ryan High School. He is a past board member of Alignment Nashville and Center for Nonprofit Management. He has been involved with the Transit Alliance of Middle Tennessee, served on the Citizens Advisory Committee for Bus Rapid Transit (BRT), MTA's Strategic Plan Advisory Committee, the NashvilleNEXT Steering Committee and Major League Soccer to Nashville advisory committee. He has participated in Leadership Nashville, Leadership Middle Tennessee and Leadership Music.

Alexa Voytek is the Coordinator for the Middle-West Tennessee Clean Cities Coalition as well as a Program Manager / Energy Analyst for the Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation's (TDEC) Office of Energy Programs. Alexa provides support for various grant programs, energy efficiency and sustainable transportation initiatives, and external communications efforts. In her role as Clean Cities coordinator, she seeks to encourage local fleets to adopt alternative fuel vehicles and advanced vehicle technologies in order to reduce petroleum dependence and improve air quality. Prior to joining TDEC, Voytek interned with the United Nations Division for Sustainable Development and the U.S. Consulate in St. Petersburg, Russia. Most recently, she served as Assistant Account Executive for New York City-based public relations firm Ketchum, Inc., where she was assigned to energy and technology related projects. 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Leslie Meehan Office of Primary Prevention, Tennessee Department of Health

Leslie Meehan, MPA AICP oversees the Office of Primary Prevention in the Commissioner's Office of the Tennessee Department of Health. The Office serves as a hub for upstream, primary prevention policies and strategies that impact social influencers of health. Her work includes increasing physical activity through the built environment to positively impact social, emotional and physical health. Previously, Ms. Meehan served ten years as the Director of Healthy Communities for the Nashville Area Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) in Tennessee. At the MPO, she focused on the intersection of transportation and health, specifically transportation's impacts on physical activity, air quality and injury. Her work has been recognized nationally and internationally, most recently by the Association of State and Territorial Health Officials (2018 Vision Award), the National Association of Chronic Disease Directors (2017 Joseph W. Cullen Excellence Award) and the Institute of Transportation Engineers (2017 Transportation Achievement Award for Planning).

Ms. Meehan is a member of the American Institute of Certified Planners, the Institute of Transportation Engineers, the Association of Bicycle and Pedestrian Professionals, the League of American Bicyclists and the Tennessee Public Health Association. She is co-author of the Transportation Sector of the National Physical Activity Plan, served as an expert advisor on the U.S. Department of Transportation and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) Transportation and Health Tool, was appointed by Transportation Secretary Peters to the National Safe Routes to School Task Force and has presented at a White House event on transportation and health. She currently serves as a panel member on the National Cooperative Highway Research Program's Research Roadmap for Transportation and Health and the



Guidebook for Communications between Transportation and Public Health Communities.

She is a member of the Transportation Research Board Taskforce on Arterials and Public Health.



Carole Westlake Executive Director, Tennessee Disability Coalition

Carol is a nationally recognized leader in the disability community and a lifelong advocate for disadvantaged people. She is the founding executive director of the Tennessee Disability Coalition where she has served for 27 years. The Coalition's work is grounded in collaborative efforts to improve policy and opportunities for individuals with disabilities and their families.

She is a graduate of Peabody College and Vanderbilt University. Her background and training are in disability, and public policy. Carol regularly serves on state boards and commissions that affect people with disabilities, especially those that promote access to health care, long term supports and services, and economic self-sufficiency. She has helped to establish a number of disability advocacy programs and agencies in Tennessee. With a passion for serving the community and empowering people with disabilities, she is an active volunteer who serves on a number of nonprofit boards.









Clifton Harris President and CEO, Urban League of Middle TN

Clifton, is a native of Cary, N.C., a long-time community organizer and advocate for the most vulnerable population (the homeless). In November 2016 He was appointed to lead the Urban League of Middle Tennessee. Harris is no stranger to the non-profit community. He has successfully managed six different non-profit agencies during his career. Harris's work has made him an expert in the field of helping homeless individuals and families. As a former Executive Director of a Foundation that served homeless families, Harris, was known as a leader who loves people with a passion to help families become successful in life. Harris set a high standard within the staff, volunteers and families served. He was appointed by former Mayor Bill Purcell to organize and lead the Metropolitan Homelessness Commission. He created and hosted Nashville's first Project Homeless Connect; an event that assisted thousands of homeless individuals in need of various much needed services.

Mr. Harris was responsible for the implementation of Nashville's Ten Year Plan to reduce and end chronic homelessness. He coordinated Nashville's efforts to implement Housing First, which places homeless people into permanent housing coupled with intensive case management. This best practice solution reshaped Nashville's approach to offering permanent solutions to the most vulnerable and chronically homeless individuals in our community. Under his leadership, the Metropolitan Homelessness Commission has created its Housing First program, implemented the nationally recognized SOAR Program that fast-tracks individuals to receiving SSI/SSDI income, and organized three Project Homeless Connect events, (provided direct services to 1,500+ individuals affected by homelessness).



Harris graduated from St. Augustine's College in Raleigh, N.C., with a degree in business administration. Harris says he is thankful that God has given him a passion for people. "I feel like the match between my passion and people is a union that is meant to be so that the good work that's to be done will become a great work in our community," says Harris. Clifton continues to be an active leader in our community. Additionally, he Co-chaired the Transit for Nashville's Engagement Coalition. He's an active member of theNashville Chamber of Commerce, a member and former Elder of Strong Tower Bible Church and an alumni of Leadership Nashville. Away from work, Clifton enjoys spending time with his lovely wife, Alfreda. They have three children and three grandchildren. Clifton also enjoys golfing.

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Michelle Lacewell Deputy Director and Chief Communications Officer, GNRC

Currently serving as the Deputy Director for the Greater Nashville Regional Council (GNRC), Michelle Lacewell oversees daily operations and human resources and leads its communications team. She provides program support to GNRC's aging and disability services, community and economic development, and regional planning department. Before joining the GNRC. Michelle spent 4 years with the Nashville Area MPO and managed the program as the interim director during the year-long integration of the MPO into the GNRC. Before her time at the MPO, she led the Nashville Area Chamber of Commerce communications and marketing team.

In 2011, Michelle relocated from Northwest Florida to Nashville, bringing her years of experience working in the public sector. Having worked for the Pensacola Chamber of Commerce and the Bay County Chamber of Commerce, she has led the development of business coalitions to deepen community engagement related to tourism, military affairs, and economic development efforts. Michelle spent five years with the Resort Collection of Panama City Beach, responsible for marketing, public relations, and government affairs. Notably, she led the company's successful crisis communication response to the BP Oil Spill in



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2010. She has also served as an adjunct professor teaching at Belmont University and Gulf Coast State College.

Michelle received her bachelor's degree from the University of West Florida and her masters in corporate and public communication from Florida State University. She is an alumnus of Leadership Middle Tennessee, Nashville Young

Leaders, and the national Transportation Innovation Academy led by Transportation for America and the TransitCenter. She is a member of the Nashville Rotary, has been a member in the Junior League of Nashville, served as a board member for PRSA's Nashville Chapter, is a past member of the Junior Achievement of Middle Tennessee's Associate Board, and is a 2016 recipient of a Nashville Emerging Leader Award (NELA).







Steve Bland

Chief Executive Officer, WeGo Public Transit and Regional Transportation Authority (RTA)

Stephen G. Bland serves as the Chief Executive Officer of WeGo Public Transit (formerly Nashville Metropolitan Transit Authority) and the Regional Transportation Authority of Middle Tennessee (RTA). During his extensive 28-year career in public transit, Steve has served as the CEO, executive director, or general manager of both large and small transit systems including Pittsburgh, PA.; Albany, N.Y.; York, Penn.; and Gloucester, Mass.

Under his leadership in Pittsburgh, his transit team completed a \$500 million New Starts Light Rail subway extension. He also served as the program director on the CTfastrack, a 9.5-mile advanced bus rapid transit system between New Britain and downtown Hartford, Conn.; and he has done other consulting work on similar projects. Prior to CTfastrack, Steve was the Assistant Director/General Superintendent for the Port Authority Trans Hudson (PATH) Rail System. PATH is a heavy rail transit system that connects Newark, Harrison, Jersey City, and Hoboken, New Jersey with various points in Manhattan, New York City operating 24 hours daily carrying approximately 250,000 commuters with a fleet of 350 revenue rail cars.



Steve holds a Master of Public Affairs in Public Finance and a Bachelor of Science in Public Affairs, with Distinction in Transportation Planning and Management from Indiana University.



Paige Brown Mayor of Gallatin

Paige Brown is the 62nd Mayor of Gallatin, Tennessee. Since January 2015, she has been passionately serving more than 35,000 residents of the city where she was born and raised. She brings the values of faith and kindness while working constructively with her colleagues, local business, and community leaders to advance practical, forward-thinking solutions to pressing city issues. A graduate of Gallatin High School and honors graduate of Florida State University, she worked as a news reporter and anchor in Florida. Upon her return to Tennessee, she worked for several shows on The Nashville Network in various roles including reporter, producer and talent. She then worked 11 years for NewsChannel 5 in Nashville, Tennessee. While producing breaking news in 2005, Brown witnessed the devastation of tornadoes that ripped through parts of her native city. That event helped cement her desire to find a way to serve Gallatin more directly. In 2006, she became the Executive Director of the Gallatin Area Chamber of Commerce. Under her leadership, the Gallatin Chamber increased membership and member participation, established numerous new events and created innovative marketing and networking opportunities. In 2010, she was elected as a Sumner County Commissioner representing the 6th District, an office she held for four years until running for Mayor of Gallatin in 2014. Mayor Brown currently represents Gallatin as a member of the



Metropolitan Planning Organization, Regional Transit Authority, Mayor's Caucus and Treasurer of the Greater Nashville Regional Council. One of the mayor's best-loved accomplishments can be found on the cover of November's Reader's Digest, where Gallatin was named the "Nicest Place in America." The special edition highlighted Gallatin as an epicenter of community spirit and trust and was distributed to millions of readers all over the world. Brown is an advocate for oncology research. She served six years on the Board of Governors for the Leukemia & Lymphoma Society and served three terms as a Food & Drug Oncology Drug Advisory Committee Patient Representative. She has been featured in stories for Glamour Magazine, PBS and local news, has addressed groups around the world, and has lobbied for healthcare related legislation in Washington.



Randall Hutto Mayor of Wilson County

Randall Hutto is a lifelong resident of Wilson County. Growing up in Watertown, he attended Watertown Elementary and graduated from Watertown High School. Dr. Ken Moore • Mayor of Franklin

Dr. Ken Moore, Mayor of Franklin is the 31st Mayor and second physician to head the City of Franklin. Ken practiced orthopedic surgery for more than twenty-eight years and gained recognition on a state and national level as a leader. In May 2012 he was elected to serve as the Chair of the Middle Tennessee Mayors Caucus that covers a 10-county area with a population of 1.67 million people, comprising 27 percent of Tennessee's population. In the same month, Mayor Moore was given the Leadership in Regional Thinking and Action Award at the Power of Ten Summit.

Outside activities include assisting to bring a new campus to Williamson County for Columbia State Community College and he currently serves as chairman of the Columbia State Foundation Board. Mayor Moore maintains a passion for delivering healthcare to the underserved and is medical director for the Shalom Foundation which provides free surgery to poor Guatemalan Children and was highly involved in the opening of a new Out-patient Surgery Center for the Foundation in Guatemala City.



Prior to serving as Vice Mayor and Mayor, Ken was elected to the Board of Mayor and Alderman in 2007 as an alderman at large. His work on the board has included Chair of the Finance Committee and has led the effort to make Franklin a top 25 sustainable City.

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Erin Hafkenschiel Executive Director, Mobility for Vanderbilt University

Erin Hafkenschiel is the Executive Director for Mobility for Vanderbilt University. In this role, she is responsible for launching the university's first-ever strategic transportation office which will lead mobility planning and policy development for the school and the creation of a comprehensive transportation-demand management program.

Erin served as the Director of the Mayor's Office of Transportation and Sustainability for Nashville Mayors David Briley and Megan Barry from 2016-2018. Erin joined Mayor Barry's office from California Environmental Associates, a sustainability-consulting firm in San Francisco. Her previous experience



includes philanthropic work for the Bay Area Council and for the William & Flora Hewlett Foundation, where she helped manage a \$22 million portfolio of environmental grants, and the launch of the China Sustainable Cities Initiative. Erin was a 2008 U.S. Fulbright Scholar to China, where she studied sustainable urban planning and transportation. In 2014, California Governor Jerry Brown appointed her to the Off-Highway Motor Vehicle Recreation Commission. Erin holds a Master's in Public Policy & Urban Planning from Harvard University, and a B.A. in Political Economy of Industrialized Societies from the University of California at Berkeley, where she was also captain of the Varsity Women's Lacrosse team.
